#### For Mischief Done

Jan Grosskopf, a former member of the Mystic Class until duty called at home for the care of her elderly parents, recently authored and published a novel (258 pages) titled, "For Mischief Done". The story begins on the morning of July 21, 1786 in Quaker Hill, CT.

A recent comment by Dru Pagliassotti (www.goodreads.com) states the following:

"This is an end-noted novelization of an actual child-killing-child case that occurred in 1786 in the Connecticut Town of New London, leaving the small town to struggle with what to do in a case where age, gender, race, upbringing, religious understanding, and overall intelligence are all potential factors in deciding whether a child should be hanged. The author, who stumbled on the case while working on her doctorate in history, does a nice job of laving out the social and moral disputes over the matter for the reader without becoming sentimental or ascribing anachronistically progressive views to historical personages. Although the novel by necessity doesn't have the twists and turns of unfettered fiction, it's an interesting slice-of-life look at very early American life and law with

plenty of commentary, notes, and references at the end for anybody who wants to learn more about the case or the period."

The book is available at your local bookstore; Amazon.com; Studio 33 in New London. It can also be downloaded for your Kindle.

I would recommend the book to anyone interested in local history. It is a very good read! Thanks Jan for a job well done!
