Challenge Classes on Hold

The Board of the New Haven Branch has been discussing the question of whether to put the Challenge Classes on hold for a year. Attendance has dropped in the last two years, and it is embarassing to invite fine teachers, often from out-of-state, to come teach us and then barely have enough dancers for a full set. Those who attend regularly are always enthusiastic. The Board is eager to hear from Branch members about this – how important these classes are to them, what they have learned from them, why they might have problems attending. Challenge Classes have been held in Middletown because of its central location for dancers from all over the state. The choice of teachers has been up to one of the New Haven Branch teachers, currently Barbara Austen. Monday nights were chosen as the one weekday night that was the least in conflict with other classes. There has been some discussion of holding the Challenge Classes on a Sunday afternoon or evening. The Board would really like to hear from you on these issues. You'll find their names listed at the end of this issue and they'll be glad to talk to you in class.

It's Not Rocket Science (it's harder)

On June 1, 2009, we had the last challenge class of the year. I continued the theme from my challenge class of the previous year, working on new figures or variations of familiar figures. We started with *The Griffin*, the first dance in which I have encountered the *Guill-aume Reel* – essentially a reel of three danced by four people. The first couple starts in the middle, dancing a figure of eight around the other two positions, while the end people dance a regular reel of three. This is easily mastered (at least everyone mastered it that night!) and it offers a lot of bang for the buck. It looks impressive with people swarming all over the place.

We then did a two-couple jig, *Falling Leaves*, composed by Andrea Taylor which, ironically, I was not sure would present enough of a challenge for a challenge class. It has no new or unknown figures, although it does contain a Men's Chain which always presents problems for some reason. We decided the word for this dance is "unforgiving." The first couple spends most of the dance below the second couple, the men's chain creates a gender-reversal which continues in the following reel of four. Both couples are in motion all the time. In general, the entire dance is slightly disorienting, enough to keep you on your toes — or just plain confused.

The strathspey, Le Petit Chat Celtique, introduced the figure le chapeau (the hat). The ever-innovative Bob McMurtry borrowed this figure from salsa rueda, where it is called "media sombrero." Le chapeau is similar to la baratte, in that it offers an opportunity to interact closely with your partner with elegant hand, arm and body positions. The other strathspey, Isle of Kaui, presented the most unusual figure of the evening, the one-way reel of four. This reel of four involves six dancers; at all times four of them are dancing a "regular" reel of four down the center of the set while the other two circulate in and out of the reel from the sidelines. Terry Glasspool introduced this at a dance event on the island of Kaui.

The evening concluded with a whole dance of Terry's devising. *The Meathook* is one of those dances, like *It's Not Rocket Science*, that looks simple on the page and even after you do it, you're not quite sure why it's hard. Try it, you'll see. In its entirety, the dance is:

1-8 1C set, cast off 1 place, dance back-to-back

9-14 2C,1C set, circle left once around

15-16 1C,3C set

17-20 1C,3C circle left once around

21-24 2C,1C,3C set and link for 3

25-28 2C,1C,3C set and link for 3

29-32 6 hands round halfway to own sides.

By the end we were exhausted and laughing hysterically. I'd like to thank everyone for their enthusiastic participation. It was fun, as always. I appreciate the opportunity to try out some of these dance-gems with your help.

Pinewoods Yet Again

Ever since I started Scottish Dance classes, I have heard about Pinewoods, a must-see summer workshop in Massachusetts. But the dates of the Scottish events conflicted with the annual vacation I took on Cape Cod with my daughter and her family. So I could only listen to tales of the theme parties, the dancing, the midnight

swims. This year my family vacation date changed, so I decided to find out what Pine-woods was all about.

Ellie Toy and I were accepted for Session I the weekend of July 10-13. We arrived late Friday afternoon, made our way uphill to our cabin in Bampton in the Bush and settled our things. Then off to the Welcome Party which we found by following the roar of talk and laughter deep in the woods. There we were welcomed by Mystic dancers and friends from New York, New Jersey and Massachusetts. The Mystic group had grown since last year when Minna, Ev and Dave went. Also there were Rick and Becky Corbett. Kat Kliphon and Leslie Rice, as well as Bob Cole from our Middletown class, and Kent and Marian Smith from West Hartford. A jolly crowd.

The Welcome Dance that night was indeed welcome with familiar dances, ending suitably with the *Pinewoods Reel*. A Burns Night Ceilidh followed with a reading of the *Ode to the Haggis* which was dutifully stabbed. Since this haggis was actually a watermelon, people gathered quickly for pieces of the juicy flesh.

The sweet sounds of a distant bagpipe worked their way into my dreams the next morning, easing the transition to daylight and what had to be done next. The classes following breakfast were held in large open-sided pavilions scattered through the woods. This year's teachers couldn't have been better with Stella Fogg from Virginia, David Queen from England and Bill Zobel from Canada. Jennifer Stephenson of Canada was there to teach Highland Dancing and Ladies' Step, and Roberta Lasnik held a daily yoga class. After lunch, I'd been invited as a first-timer to a meeting which turned out to be a cocktail party featuring gin and tonics. By now I'd come to realize Pinewoods was a party workshop in every way. And the beat went on.

Since the theme for the Saturday Ball was Christmas, many who gathered for the Grand March wore Santa hats, and red was the featured color. The Ball pavilion was decorated with strings of lights and large 3-D sparkling paper snowflakes. Happily many of the Ball dances had been danced in our Connecticut events, leaving us free to enjoy the evening. The ceilidh that



followed had some fine acts, the most unusual being one in which a woman played a violin which a man took

over, first the fingering, then the bowing while she slipped out from under his arms. Then she did it all in reverse, and the tune never missed a note.

Again those distant pipes telling us to wake up. After the day's classes, people disappeared to dress for the Valentine's Day Tea featuring famous lovers. Most of us managed to add some detail to our finery – felt hearts, lace collar, heart-shaped earrings. But quite a few had planned ahead, turning up dressed as Anthony and Cleopatra or Adam and Eve (not quite naked). There were



two cupids leaping around with bow and arrow, and one Cleopatra arrived in a chair, carried by four men. Chris and Sue Ronald were the most imaginative, dressed as the Owl and the Pussycat, walking around inside a cardboard peagreen boat. To call this a tea party was hardly accurate. The Valentini punch packed a real wallop making everyone merry.

The musicians for the two Scottish sessions were a large group of terrific performers. Tom Pixton was music director, and his ceilidh act with the accordion was notable. Four fiddlers - Paul Anderson, Debbie Billmers, Keith Smith and Susan Worland. Barbara Pixton played bass and piano; Mike MacNintch the bagpipe, and last but not least, Muriel Johnstone shone at the piano. The Sunday night dance held the now familiar combo of dances that we knew with some brand new mixed in, including The Ribble Valley Ramblers by Dave Queen, one of our teachers. The afterparty was held in one of the large group cabins and went, I learned later, until past 3 in the morning. It was hard to leave these great social gatherings where everyone had something interesting to say. As we drove home the next morning, we could see why the mention of Pinewoods makes so many people's eyes light up with remembered pleasure.

NUTMEG EVENING PROGRAM

Golden Apple Jig

40J3

- 1–8 1C dance down below 3C, cast up around them, turn left hand 11/4 times, face 1st corners; 2C step up on 3-4
- 9-16 1C set to corners & partner (Hello-goodbye), finish back-to-back facing 3rd corner diagonally opposite (partner's first corner)
- 17-24 Diagonal reel of 4 with 3rd corners, pass left shoulders at end of 24 to face 2nd corners
- 25-32 Diagonal reel of 4 with 2nd corners, finish 2nd place on own side
- 33–40 Circle 6 hands round and back.

Carleton Strathspey

32S3

- 1-4 1C set, cast into 2nd place, 2C step up on 3-4
- 5-8 1C dance left shoulder around 1st corners, finish in 2nd place on opposite sides
- 9-12 All set, cross right hands; 1C face out
- 13-16 1M cast up round 2M, dance into center, pull back right shoulder to face up; 1W cast down around 3W, dance up to center, pull back right shoulder to face down
- 17-20 1M with 2C, 1W with 3C dance right hands across; 1C finish in 2nd place opposite sides
- 21-24 All chase clockwise round set to own sides; on bar 24 all dance into middle, take promenade hold facing up.
- 25-32 All dance 3-couple allemande.

All for Mary

32R3

- 1-4 1C cross over right hands, cast off 1 place; 2C step up on 3-4
- 5-8 1C dance petronella turn, finish man between 2C, facing down, woman between 3C, facing up, all set
- 9-12 All advance & retire up and down the set
- 13-16 1C dance petronella turn, finish 2nd place own side, all set
- 17-24 Reels of 3 on sides; to begin: 1W,2W (also 1M, 3M) pass right shoulders, on bar 24, 1W curve up to finish between 2C, while 1M curve down to finish between 3C; 2C,3C dance loop at end of reel to finish facing in ready for:
- 25-30 Reels of 3 across the dance; to begin: 1W,2W (also 1M,3M) pass right shoulders
- 31-32 1C cross over right hands.

The Express

40J3

- 1-16 Mirror reels of 3 on sides, 1C crossing to opposite side, then back own side
- 17-24 1C down the middle and up
- 25-32 1C,2C allemande; 1C finish back to back in 2nd place
- 33-40 Double triangles.

Jack on the Green

32S3

- 1-4 1C dance toward each other 1 step, cast own sides to 2nd place; 2C step up on 3-4
- 5-8 1C cast off again around 3C, finish side by side

- in 2nd place facing 2C
- 9-12 1C face up, 2C face down, set to each other across the dance, release hands, turn to face partner at end of 2nd step, 1C,2C face own partners, set, 1C turning onwards to face down at end of 2nd step
- 13-16 1C face down, 3C face up, set to each other across the dance, release hands, turn to face partners,1C pass each other left shoulder, advance to face 1st corners
- 17-24 1C turn corner, partner, corner, partner, end in 2nd place own sides
- 25-32 2C,1C,3C circle six hand round and back. *at the end of 2nd time through, 1C cast off to the bottom while 4C step up to 3rd place.

<u>Fireside Reel</u> 32R3

- 1-4 1M cast off, turn 2W right hand, end in her place, 2W dancing toward 1W place
- 5-8 1W cast above 1M, turn 2M to end in his place; 2W end in 1W place on bar 6
- 9-12 1C lead down nearer hands, cast up round 3C to 2nd place on partner's side
- 13-16 1C, 2C dance half rights & lefts; finish facing in on the diagonal
- 17-24 1C, 2C set, Petronella one place to right; repeat; 1C ends in 2nd place, 1W facing down, 1M facing up
- 25-30 1C dance reel of 3 on sides, right shoulder to 2nd corners to begin
- 31-32 1C cross right hand to own sides.

Break

<u>Haste to the Wedding</u> 32J3

- 1-4 1C turn right hand halfway; lead down middle
- 5-8 1C turn right hand halfway; lead up to place
- 9-16 2C repeat bars 1-8
- 17-24 1C,2C set, dance right hands across halfway; set, dance left hands across halfway
- 25-32 1C,2C Poussette.

<u>Cherrybank Gardens</u> 32S 3C set

- 1-4 1W,2W & 1M,2M join nearer hands, set on sides. petronella in tandem, finish facing down and up
- 5-8 1W,2W & 1M,2M join nearer hands, set facing down and up, petronella in tandem finish on opposite sides in the order 2,1
- 9-12 2C,1C join nearer hands, set on opposite sides, 2C cross right hand, while 1C cross left hand
- 13-16 1W dance right hands across with 2C, while 1M dance right hands across with 3C; 1C finish in 2nd place on own sides
- 17-20 1C,3C join nearer hands on the sides, set & link
- 21-24 3C,1C dance 4 hands round to the left, finish with 3C facing down, 1C facing up
- 25-32 2C,3C,1C dance the grand chain. *Repeat with a new top couple.*

<u>Note</u> Petronella in Tandem: 1W dances in, turning petronella-wise to finish facing down; 2W follows closely

behind 1W, i.e. in tandem, also turning petronella-wise to finish on the left of 1W; 2M & 1M dance similarly to finish facing up.

Winter Wonder 32R3

- 1-4 1C cross right hand, cast off 1 place; 2C step up on 3-4
- 5-8 1C dance down between 3C with nearer hands, cast up to 2nd place on the sides, face 2C
- 9-16 2M,1W & 2W,1M set, turn halfway right hand, set, turn halfway left hand, ready for:
- 17-24 2C,1C dance Ladies' Chain
- 25-28 2C,1C,3C advance & retire
- 29-32 1C dance half figure of 8 around 3C, crossing down to begin.

<u>Graduation Jig</u> 32J3

- 1-4 1C set advancing, join both hands to slip down 4 steps to below 3C
- 5-8 1C cast up to original places
- 9-16 1C dance crossover mirror reels of 3, finish facing 2nd corners, 2C finish in 1st place
- 17-24 1C dance diagonal reel of 4 with 2nd corners; 1C finish passing partner right shoulder, end in 2nd place on wrong sides
- 25-28 1C set advancing, taking both hands briefly, then dance petronella turn 1 place to right
- 29-32 1C set advancing, taking both hands briefly, dance a petronella turn to end 2nd place.

The Fete 32S3

- 1-8 1C,2C set on sides; 1C,2C dance half rights & lefts; 2C,1C repeat 1-4 back to place
- 9-16 1C dance down the middle and up; end in 2nd place own sides; 2C step up on 3-4
- 17-24 1C,3W dance 3 hands round to left; 1C,3M dance 3 hands round to left; 1C finish 2nd place own sides 25-32 2C,1C dance pousette right round.

Four's a Score 32R3

- 1-4 1C dance half figure of 8 down around the 2C, finish 1st place opposite sides
- 5-8 1C dance half figure of 8 down around the 3C, 1C finish 2nd place own side
- 9-12 1C cross left hand, cast to their left, 1W down, 1M up
- 13-16 1C approach each other up and down the dance, turn right hand, 1C finish facing 1st corner
- 17-20 Dance corner pass and turn: 1C dance around 1st corner right shoulder, pass right shoulders to face 2nd corner, meanwhile 1st corners dance in, turn by the right, dance out to place
- 21-24 Dance 2nd corner pass and turn
- 25-32 2C,1C, 3C circle 6 hands round and back.
